

Stanford e-Japan

The Stanford Program on International and Cross-Cultural Education (SPICE) would like to invite all interested Japanese high school students to apply to the **Spring 2017 Stanford University Scholars Program for Japanese High School Students**.

The Stanford University Scholars Program for Japanese High School Students or “Stanford e-Japan” is a distance-learning course sponsored by SPICE. Stanford e-Japan will enroll exceptional high school students from Japan to engage in an intensive study of U.S. society and culture. The course underscores the importance of U.S.–Japan relations. Ambassadors, top scholars, and experts throughout the United States will provide web-based lectures and engage students in live discussion sessions or “virtual classes.” **The course will be offered in English.**

The web-based lectures will include historical topics such as the importance of early U.S.–Japan relations and World War II; contemporary topics such as Silicon Valley and entrepreneurship, high schools in the United States, and Japanese baseball players in Major League Baseball; and other topics of interest to Japanese students.

Students will participate in 10–12 “virtual classes” via the Internet from February to June 2017. Please note that the classes will continue throughout the spring holiday. The “virtual classes” will be offered 2–3 times a month on Saturday afternoons (1 PM Japan time). Students should expect to allot 3–4 hours per week to complete the lectures, discussions, readings, and assignments. Since this is a distance-learning course, however, students will be able to structure most of the work around their individual schedules.

The course will culminate in an independent research project. Final research projects will be printed in journal format, and students will also be required to lead one presentation on U.S. society at their schools or in their local communities.

Students who successfully complete the course will receive a Certificate of Completion from SPICE, Stanford University. Although intensive, Stanford e-Japan will equip Japanese students with a rare degree of expertise about U.S. society and culture and U.S.–Japan relations that may have a significant impact on their choices of study and future careers. 2017 Stanford e-Japan 推薦状

スタンフォード大学・日本高校生プログラム「Stanford e-Japan」はStanford Program on International and Cross-Cultural Education (SPICE) が主催する通信教育プログラムです。Stanford e-Japan は日本の優秀な学生に、アメリカの社会と文化を集中的に学んでもらいます。また、授業は日米関係の重要性を強調していきます。全米のあらゆる優秀な教授や、学者、専門家がライブ・ディスカッションや「バーチャルクラス」を通してウェブベースの講義を提供します。*講義は全て英語で行われます。

ウェブベースの講義は、日米関係や、第二次世界大戦などを含む歴史的なトピックから、シリコンバレーと起業家、アメリカの教育、メジャーリーグで活躍する日本人選手といった、現代のトピックを含みます。

2017年2月から6月の期間、10-12の「バーチャルクラス」に参加してもらいます。「バーチャルクラス」は月に2-3回、土曜日の午後（日本時間午後1時）に行われます。講義、ディスカッション、リーディング、課題などを達成するために、週に3-4時間の時間を割り当てる事が求められます。しかし、これは通信教育などで、学生は個々のスケジュールを中心に作業を構造することができます。

このプログラムは、研究プロジェクトが最終課題となります。最終研究プロジェクトはジャーナル形式で印刷され、それぞれの学校、または地域コミュニティにて、アメリカ社会についての発表を行ってもらいます。

プログラムを修了した学生には、スタンフォード大学・SPICE から修了証書が送られます。このプログラムはインテンシブではありますが、アメリカの社会や文化と日米関係に関する専門知識を、あらゆる角度で学ぶ事ができ、学生の将来のキャリア選択に大きな影響を与える機会をつくります。
